Our Mission:





Things to remember

- Park hours 6:30 a.m. to dusk.
- Winter schedule 8 a.m. to dusk. Although most parks are open year round, some parks or portions of parks are closed during the winter. For a winter schedule and information about seasonal closures, visit www.parks.state.wa.us or call the information center at (360) 902-8844.
- Wildlife, plants and all park buildings, signs, tables and other structures are protected; removal or damage of any kind is prohibited. Hunting, feeding of wildlife and gathering firewood on state park property is prohibited.
- Pets must be on leash and under physical control at all times. This includes trail areas and campsites. Pet owners must clean up after pets on all state park lands.

The Discover Pass is required for day visits to state parks and access to other state-managed recreation lands. The pass provides access to millions of acres of parks, wildlife areas, trails, natural areas and water-access sites. The annual pass is transferable between two vehicles. • Annual pass: \$30 • One-day pass: \$10 (transaction and dealer fees may apply)



Welcome to Squak Mountain



Squak Mountain State Park is

a forested day-use
park just outside of
Issaquah and a short
15-minute drive from
Seattle. This 1570-acre
park is a wilderness with
glimpses of the city below.

The park has miles of winding trails alongside bubbling creeks and narrow ravines.

Hiking opportunities

There are 13 miles of hiking trail and 6 miles of hiker/equestrian trail on this 2,024-foot high mountain. Trail difficulty ranges from easy to strenuous, including a little something for everyone. Trails also continue onto King County and City of Issaquah park lands, creating many extended loop options.

The park features a self-guided interpretive walk along the 0.3-mile Pretzel Tree Trail adjacent to the main trailhead of S.E. May Valley Road. The trail signage illustrates the adventures of Field Mouse as he meets local forest creatures and discovers their importance in the ecosystem on his search for the Pretzel Tree.

Park amenities and facilities

Squak Mountain State Park offers the following amenities and facilities to make your visit more enjoyable and comfortable:

- Six unsheltered picnic tables are available first come, first served
- Horse ramp (accessible to people with disabilities)
- 13 miles of hiking trail, six miles of equestrian trail and 0.3 miles of interpretive trail
- Restroom
- There is no potable water at the park

Lake Sammamish State Park

is a popular 531-acre park featuring 6,858 feet of waterfront, a deciduous forest, wetland vegetation, three salmon-bearing streams and a great blue heron heronry.

The park is a great place to get together with family or friends for a picnic or to hold an event for work or social groups. There are 475 picnic tables, 75 barbeque grills and two volleyball courts that are available first come, first served. There are three picnic shelters that can be reserved up to nine months in advance.

To make a reservation, call (888) CAMPOUT or (888) 226-7688.

- The Kitchen Shelter (S1) accommodates up to 400 people. It has two sinks and a center counter with electrical outlets. A sand volleyball court and a large open playfield are adjacent to the shelter.
- The Creek Shelter (S2) near the bank of Issaguah Creek, accommodates up to 200 people. It offers an excellent view of Lake Sammamish. A sand volleyball court and a large open playfield are adjacent to the shelter.
- The Rotunda Shelter (S3) accommodates up to 100 people. It has a central fireplace and a sand volleyball court.
- · Hans Jensen Youth Group Camp Situated on the bank of Laughing Jacobs Creek, this group camp accommodates up to 200 overnight campers and has parking for 75 vehicles. The camp - available to youth organizations - features 36 picnic tables, 7 campfire rings, a covered shelter, two amphitheaters and four vault toilets.

RECREATIONAL OPPORTUNITIES AT LAKE SAMMAMISH

SWIMMING

The park's warm water - with 70 to 75 degree temperatures in the summer - makes it a popular destination for swimmers. Adjacent to Sunset Beach are restrooms, changing rooms, beach showers and picnic areas. Concession stands are available seasonally at both Sunset Beach and Tibbetts Beach.

PLAYGROUNDS

In 2016, a new all-access playground opened near Sunset Beach. Other playground equipment also can be found at Tibbetts Beach and at the south end of the Sunset Beach picnic area.

WATER ACTIVITIES


Lake Sammamish is popular for boating and fishing. The State Parks watercraft launch area - the only public launch site on the lake - features a launch ramp, five docks and parking for up to 225 cars and trailers. Kayak, stand-up paddle boards and pedal boats are available for rent most summer days at Tibbetts Beach.

SOFTBALL FIELDS

One softball field, located south of the Tibbetts Beach parking lot, is available on a first-come, first-served basis.

SOCCER FIELDS

The Issaquah Soccer Club maintains and operates 9 soccer fields at the park. Seven full-size soccer fields are .25 mile east of the park entrance on N.W. Sammamish Road. Two modifiable fields are located .6 miles further east on N.W. Sammamish Road. Call the club at (425) 272-2699 to schedule soccer field use or for soccer information. Organized field use requires permission from both the soccer club and the park.

Discover Pass FAQs

What is a discover pass?

The Discover Pass offers you access to millions of acres of state recreation lands in Washington, including:

- More than 100 developed state parks
- More than 350 primitive recreation sites, including campgrounds and picnic areas
- Nearly 700 water-access points
- Nearly 2,000 miles of designated water and land recreation trails
- More than 80 natural areas
- More than 30 wildlife areas

A Discover Pass is required for all vehicles parking in Washington State Parks and on Washington Fisheries and Wildlife and Department of Natural Resources land.



How much is a discover pass?

Daily: \$10Annually: \$30

What if I take public transit or walk?

Anyone who takes public transit, walks, rolls, or rides their bike into a state park does **not** need to purchase a Discover Pass.

What are Free Days?

Discover Pass FAQs(Continued)

Can I use my national parks pass?

No, National Parks are owned by the Federal Government. Fees paid to the National Park Service do not contribute to maintaining Washington State Parks.



Are there alternatives to the Discover Pass?

Yes! Here are the current discount passes available:

Where do I purchase a Discover Pass?

At the Park:

- Saltwater State Park has an automated pay station at the park entrance. Stop at the booth and use the automated pay station to purchase a day or annual pass.
- Dash Point State Park has an automated pay station at the beach parking area. One parked, head toward the path by the beach and use the automated pay station to purchase a day or annual pass.
